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FROM THE CHAIRMAN & CEO



MARTIN SNEDDEN NZC CHAIRMAN

The greatest achievement in New Zealand's cricket history, and a magnificent whole-of-cricket effort to maintain a vibrant sport, notwithstanding a massive national health challenge; such was our 2020/21 year.

Hats off to the BLACKCAPS in making and then winning the ICC World Test Championship Final. In the euphoria of that brilliant victory over India, we shouldn't

forget about the succession of preceding Test series victories that saw the team accumulate enough points to pip Australia for a place in the inaugural final.

Some said NZ was lucky to be there. The sustained performance over the six-day final proved not only that our team deserved to be there but that they were worthy of being the first WTC champions. Huge credit to all the players and coaching

staff, but also to NZC's GM of High Performance, Bryan Stronach, and his team whose behind-the-scenes contributions were vital.

Covid-19 continued to be an enormous challenge throughout the year. But the unity and cohesion that existed throughout our network meant that cricket barely missed a beat – community participation numbers continued the upward trend of recent years; we delivered

full men's and women's international and domestic playing schedules, and we found excellent solutions that enabled our BLACKCAPS and WHITE FERNs teams to safely play offshore.

NZC must acknowledge the incredible support we received throughout from the NZ Government and its agencies.

Covid-19 aside, cricket in New Zealand is undergoing significant positive change. This is best exemplified by looking at how cricket is now engaging with women and girls. By the end of 2020/21 the numbers of female directors on NZC, MA and DA Boards had reached 80, up from only 11 five years ago.

Across many fronts, not just in governance, cricket's engagement with women and girls has improved dramatically since the release of our 2016 Women & Cricket report, as each of that report's 17 recommendations are being implemented. New Zealand is now well-placed to host a memorable ICC Women's Cricket World Cup in 2022.

NZC's relationship with ICC and other ICC member countries is in excellent shape. NZC was extremely proud when, in December 2021, NZC Chair Greg Barclay was appointed

ICC Chair. On behalf of our cricket community, I pay warm tribute to the positive leadership Greg gave to our board, our organisation, and our national member network, during his five years as chair.

Greg's elevation to ICC Chair resulted in me being appointed NZC Chair. I am acutely conscious that, by constitution, NZC is the guardian of cricket played within New Zealand. This means NZC must not only govern and manage our own business prudently and in the best interests of cricket, but that we must support our MA and DA members to do the same. I am committed to this being the case. NZC's ability to fully discharge that guardianship responsibility is enhanced by the quality and dedication of our Board and Management.

There have been a number of recent changes to the Board but the strength and stability of NZC's governance platform has not diminished. I thank all current board members and also pay special tribute to Liz Dawson and Don MacKinnon, who both retired from the Board in November 2020 after contributing so much quality to NZC governance since 2013.

David White and his whole team deserve our gratitude for not only

fully delivering on our 2020-21 operational plan but doing so under the pressure and volatility of a Covid environment where things were changing dramatically on a regular basis. David led with a calmness and optimism that inspired his team to find workable solutions to just about everything Covid could throw at cricket.

But our cricket network doesn't succeed just because of NZC. The performances of our MAs and DAs this past year were equally impressive. On behalf of NZC, I thank all those who lead and all who are part of our member associations, as well as our clubs, and schools for their commitment and skills. This includes those thousands who, week after week, volunteer to help make this happen.

So we now move into a new year, still facing massive Covid challenges, but buoyed by the knowledge that, collectively, we can handle these, and by the anticipation of, in a few short months, hosting the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup 2022.

The 2020-21 year, the second in which we were confronted by the difficulties of the global COVID-19 pandemic was, for a variety of reasons, like no other.

Lockdowns of various degrees and severity; managed isolation requirements, travel restrictions, crowd limitations and, not least, new variations of the virus itself, combined to create an extremely challenging year for all involved – and particularly the players.

On the other hand, NZC can look back at the past 12 months with considerable satisfaction, having hosted a full home summer of both community and professional cricket, and carefully navigated the turbulence so that its financial position remains healthy and stable.

There can be no doubt the current pandemic environment created financial challenges. However, following prudent cost-saving measures and other sacrifices at NZC-level, it is with some satisfaction that I can announce a surplus of \$160,000 for the 2020-21 year.

This solid financial position means NZC has been able to update a simple Business Plan for the 2021-22 year, one that reflects continued financial security for all levels of the game in New Zealand, along with a goal of meeting all our international and domestic broadcasting commitments.

This year was the first of our new, six-year broadcasting agreement with Spark Sport and TVNZ, and I am delighted to report on the success of the venture. Put simply,

in the 2020-21 home season, more people watched cricket in New Zealand than ever before – and we're confident of building further on this momentum in the seasons to come.

Over the past summer every one of our Dream11 Super Smash games was screened live in some form, and the double-headers of men's and women's games were very well received. Of the 64 games played, 52 were shown live on Spark Sport (of which 28 were broadcast free-to-air on TVNZ), and the remaining 12 were carried live on our NZC YouTube platform.

Particularly pleasing were the increases in the number of younger people engaging in the game, in a variety of ways and on many different devices. One of the chief aims of the agreement with Spark

Sport was to re-connect with the youth of New Zealand and the outcome from the past summer shows we are on the right track.

Evidence of this, apart from the raw viewership data, was clearly reflected on our social media channels, and particularly our YouTube platform – which grew from fewer than 40,000 subscribers in 2019-20, to more than a million over the past season.

Further evidence of increased engagement could be found in our annual census figures, which last year showed a healthy five percent rise in participation in male cricket, and an encouraging seven percent increase in the female ranks. I do not consider the new agreement with Spark Sport and TVNZ, and the strong census numbers, a coincidence.

One of the key projects NZC has undertaken this year is designed to sustain that increase in participation. The Strengthen & Adapt programme, when fully implemented, will address a range of initiatives calculated to directly address participation numbers and particularly those of girls and women, including:

- Re-establishing a National Development Plan
- Developing a National Workforce Framework
- Developing Female Leaders
- Strengthening the Trainer and Coach Developer Network
- Supporting the Auckland Cricket Bat First initiative in low decile and high deprivation schools

Commercially, NZC enjoys strong relationships with ANZ, Ford, G.J. Gardner Homes, Gillette, DB Breweries, KFC, Powerade, Canterbury (CCC) and Dream11, while the growing brand awareness of our BLACKCAPS and WHITE FERNS – both home and internationally, attracts and drives new agreements. To all our commercial partners, my sincere thanks for your support.

Without a doubt, the jewel in the 2020-21 crown was the BLACKCAPS outstanding performance in winning the inaugural ICC World Test Championship (WTC), after beating India on the last day of the final played at the Ageas Bowl in Southampton, England.

Along with the WHITE FERNS' World Cup win in 2000, this ranks as easily the most significant achievement in NZC history and, unsurprisingly, sparked much celebration in New Zealand – later acknowledged with a nationwide BLACKCAPS road-trip featuring the inaugural WTC trophy – the Mace.

Hearty congratulations to all involved in this success, and particularly to captain Kane Williamson, and coach Gary Stead.

Of course, none of the past year's achievements would have been possible without the support of our nationwide cricket family – the Major Associations, the District Associations, the clubs, volunteers, officials, coaches and, not least, the staff of NZC – all of whom have,

successfully, helped us through the most challenging of years.

In particular, I would like to thank the NZC Board for its support and make special mention of our strong relationship with the New Zealand Cricket Players Association, without which the past year could have easily become so very difficult. Thank you all; your help has been hugely appreciated.

It's also timely at this stage to send a vote of thanks to the New Zealand Government, which helped create an environment in which we could continue to play cricket over the past year, and to the Boards of the six teams that agreed to undergo managed isolation in our country for the sake of playing international cricket.

Finally, the upcoming ICC Women's Cricket World Cup 2022, to be hosted throughout the country in February-March, will undoubtedly be the highlight of the upcoming home international season. To all involved in the Local Organising Committee, and to the WHITE FERNS especially, may I extend to you my very best wishes.

ICC WORLD TEST CHAMPIONSHIP

ON TOP OF THE WORLD!

Two years of toil culminated with the BLACKCAPS claiming victory in the inaugural ICC World Test Championship Final against India in Southampton.

It was a crowning moment for the BLACKCAPS who had earlier in the year become the number one ranked Test side in the world after winning all four home Tests against West Indies and Pakistan respectively, to book their spot in the Final.

A rain-affected match and a skilful Indian side would take the BLACKCAPS to the final session of the sixth day to claim the Test world title - a feat hailed as one of the greatest day's in New Zealand sporting history.

It was a quintessential BLACKCAPS 'team performance' with every player chipping in at some stage over the six days. Kyle Jamieson was named Player of the Final for his match figures of 7-61, which included the dismissal of Indian captain Virat Kohli in each innings.

The experienced trio of Tim Southee (5), Trent Boult (5) and Neil Wagner (3) accounted for the remaining 13 wickets, aided by

some typically first class catching led by the retiring BJ Watling, who claimed five important catches including one with a broken finger on the final day.

Devon Conway and Tom Latham's opening stands of 70 and 33, along with Kane Williamson's (49 and 52*) proved crucial in a low scoring match, as did some runs from the tail.

It was fitting that an unbroken 96-run partnership between veteran Ross Taylor (47*) and captain Williamson sealed the historic victory in the final session as the sun began to set in Southampton.

The iconic image of the legendary pair walking off arm-in-arm, two years on from the heartbreak of the ICC Cricket World Cup 2019 in the same country, was a moment to savour for all New Zealand cricket fans old and new, at home and abroad.

A total of 22 players represented the team over the two-year WTC period, with the team claiming three series wins, one series draw and one series loss to qualify for the Final.

Following the victory and a subsequent stint in MIQ, the New Zealand-based players took the famed Mace on a nationwide tour of the country to celebrate with the entire cricket family.

Starting at sunrise on Tim Southee's farm in Northland and finishing at dusk in the deep south of Jacob Duffy country - the Mace enjoyed a whirlwind week-long adventure with thousands of fans able to get up close and personal with the trophy and their local BLACKCAPS.

The successful WTC campaign is perhaps best encapsulated by the Maori proverb:

Ehara taku toa I te toa takitahi, engari taku toa I te toa takitini - the success is not of one person, but of the collective.

From the 11 players on the park in Southampton, to their 11 teammates who featured over the two year tournament, their coaches and support staff, the NZC network and associations, right through to the BLACKCAPS fans in Aotearoa and around the world - this was indeed a great team effort.

The 2020-21 season saw New Zealand Cricket embark on a new broadcasting direction with the introduction of Spark Sport and TVNZ as television rights partners and MediaWorks as audio partner.

These outlets were determined to freshen up the delivery of cricket along with the addition of new faces, voices and opinions along with new streaming technology designed to cut through to Kiwis anywhere, anytime.

The results were striking.

One year into the six-year deal with Spark Sport and TVNZ, which is a ground-breaking combination of free-to-air and digital subscription, and the viewing figures were already reflecting an uptick in audience consumption, despite the challenges posed by the Covid-19 pandemic.

Headlining the findings from the recent season have been statistics showing more viewers tuning into cricket than ever before; more people watching women's cricket

than ever before, more young people watching cricket, and more cricket being viewed by fans "on the go" – via a range of mobile devices.

Of particular note for the international game over the past summer:

- The six matches screened live on TVNZ 1 reached 1.86m unique viewers
- Nearly 240,000 Spark Sport viewers watched the BLACKCAPS and WHITE FERNS
- Test match viewing numbers were very encouraging
- There was an enormous increase in engagement, in terms of both highlights packages consumed, and average time spent viewing

In addition to these snapshots, there was a significant increase in viewership of both the men's and women's Super Smash.

NZC was also buoyed by the first of their new three-year deal with radio and audio commentary partner MediaWorks, which provided ball-by-ball commentary of BLACKCAPS and

WHITE FERNS games via Magic Talk and its streaming app 'rova'.

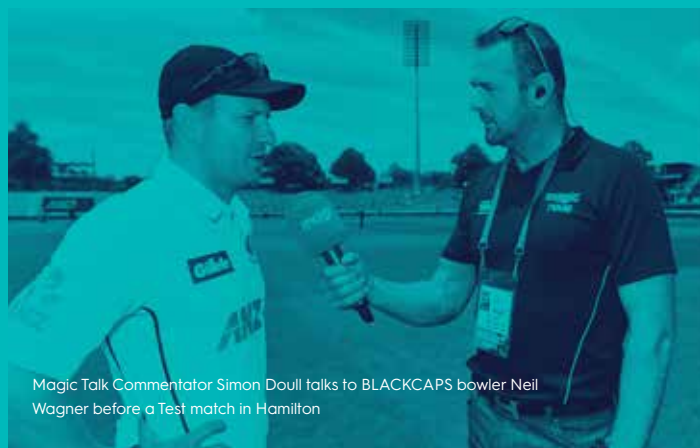
The game-day coverage introduced a range of voices and opinions, led by accomplished broadcasters Simon Doull and Ricki Swannell, and backed up with household cricket names like John Bracewell and Chris Martin.

The live data produced by the streaming platform 'rova' also allowed MediaWorks to produce deeper insights into their audiences by charting the demographic breakdown and flow of listeners during matches.

Along with the broadcasts, one of the really beneficial aspects of the MediaWorks partnership has been the backing of their powerful stable of commercial radio stations headlined by More FM, The Rock, The Edge, George FM and The Breeze, with on-air cricket promotion and player appearances a regular fixture throughout the summer.

CRICKET NETWORK

From what started as a season of uncertainty, became one to remember. Zoom calls and the ongoing development of a connected Cricket Network, meant that the season began with real clarity and a clear plan to deal with any interruptions caused by Covid-19. With support from the Sport New Zealand Community Resilience Fund and Good Sports grants from ANZ, the community game hit the ground running. Despite all of the uncertainty and challenges community cricket faced in the 2020-21 season, the combined efforts of volunteers, clubs, schools, MAs, DAs and NZC has resulted in growth of 5% across organised cricket and 33% in programme and festival cricket.

The network cohesion continues to evolve as a direct result of the Cricket Network Partnership Investment (CNPI) agreement framework introduced in August 2018. NZC committed to maintain its investment in community cricket, while the link to strategic priorities, associated KPIs, and performance accountability continues to drive progress.

Some examples of the progress catalysed by this targeted approach are:

- The number of player profiles accurately captured on CricHQ increased from 5,000 in August 2018 to 62,000 in April 2021
- Health & Safety and Risk planning and review undertaken across all cricket associations in New Zealand
- Volunteers within all clubs and associations across New Zealand registered within a volunteer database, enabling them to be rewarded and thanked for their ongoing contributions to cricket
- The use of CricHQ's match scoring functionality increased from 32% (two seasons ago) to 67% of all matches played from junior to adult grades having full scorecards
- Coach development plans created and executed throughout the country ensuring that the development of coaches and quality of experience of participants is emphasised
- The Sport New Zealand 'Balance is Better' philosophy has been adopted and implemented across cricket and is used in all game development decisions
- 80 female directors on NZC, MA and DA boards, up from 11 in 2016 – on track to ensure that, by December 2021, all our boards have a 40% minimum representation of female directors

Youth girls' cricket has made significant progress over the last season. After two years of piloting the Yeah! Girls programme, it is now exceedingly-well embedded. 2,500 girls participated in the 2020-21 season with 116 Hubs spread across New Zealand and over 60 activators trained and delivering a fun, engaging product designed for teenage girls. This programme along with the focus on Female Governance is changing the face of community cricket and its network. Conversations around the board table and in cricket offices around New Zealand are more diverse than ever before.

The foundations are being laid for the future of community cricket. From 1998 to 2010 NZC had a National Development Plan (NDP) that created alignment and cohesion across the community game from formats to coaching. The plan was abandoned in 2010 and can be directly correlated with a significant decrease in participation. With the support of the Strengthen & Adapt fund from Sport New Zealand, NZC is redeveloping an NDP for cricket with the support of the Community Cricket Network. Advisory Groups from within the network will provide support and recommendations to NZC to help guide a path back to having a plan that aligns community cricket.

A SUMMER LIKE NO OTHER

Despite the ongoing uncertainties of events in a Covid-19 world, cricket fans across New Zealand had the opportunity to see our BLACKCAPS and WHITE FERNS play around the country for the majority of the 2020-21 season, and at discounted prices. With visits from West Indies, Pakistan, Australia and Bangladesh men, and Australia and England women, there were plenty of opportunities with only two of twenty-seven international matches forced to be played without crowds.

Following a bumper Tier one international season in 2019-20, we still managed to sell out more international matches than any prior season and achieve an overall ticket revenue of \$2.1m. Prior to impacted matches, we were on track to sell out Eden Park and hit the highest ticket sales for cricket at Sky Stadium since the ICC Cricket World Cup 2015. Ticket sale trends indicated that the potential revenue loss from the three affected matches was close to \$1.5m. Had these games gone ahead, the season revenue would have exceeded \$3.5m, well ahead of the \$2.5m budgeted for the season.

With anticipation building for a potential ICC World Test Championship Final, New Zealanders made their support known by showing up in their numbers at Test matches. Outstanding attendances were particularly evident on Boxing Day at Bay Oval and in the new year at Hagley Oval.

Beyond attendance, growth was evident across all our digital touchpoints. The Cricket Nation fanbase grew by 9,400 new marketable members, social channels surpassed season targets and, through access to archive highlights and match highlights in real-time, the NZC YouTube channel went from less than 40,000, to over one million subscribers. Over the course of the season, 550+ videos were posted on YouTube (65 previous season) and 2,950+ across social channels (965 previous season). Our YouTube channel is now the biggest of any NSO in New Zealand, more than double the All Blacks, with great opportunities for further commercial growth.

To top off a summer like no other, the BLACKCAPS went on to win arguably the most significant cricket tournament to date – the ICC World Test Championship. Capturing the attention of the nation, and the world, the BLACKCAPS achievement catapulted growth of our channels even further. In a fitting end to the season, the BLACKCAPS and Support Staff took the WTC Mace on a whistle-stop tour of the country.

The victory was a timely reminder that professional sport is not always about who has the most money. It has shown that cooperation, collegiality and alignment can play a massive part in performance, and that being small also has some advantages – such as being agile and nimble with an ability to adapt and change. Being a small country places a priority on being resourceful and making good decisions – something Kiwis across the country can very much relate to.

HIGH PERFORMANCE

NZC's High Performance programme is focused on producing well rounded athletes that inspire New Zealanders. Key to this is providing our athletes with opportunities to learn and cultivate their skills, so that when they are finally selected to wear the Fern, they can walk out onto the park and execute their skills confidently on the world stage. The learning cycle is important to all those in the HP programme, not just our athletes. It also drives coach development, sport psychology, talent identification and development, medical, nutrition, strength and conditioning and performance analysis. Learning to plan, implement change from those plans, reflecting on what is working and what is not, and learning from mistakes, is key to improving performance, reducing pressure, and allowing our athletes to play their natural game.

The High Performance centralised winter programme continues to provide an environment for this kind of learning. The outstanding new permanent marquee structure at Bay Oval offers a world class training facility all year around, while the winter training facilities at Lincoln continue to produce exceptional pitches each winter for our athletes. With these two hubs strategically positioned on both islands, NZC can now offer more focused training opportunities on grass for our athletes over the winter. The skilled ground staff at both venues have been able to prepare pitches similar to those that the BLACKCAPS and WHITE FERNS are about to face as they head overseas. This is crucial in terms of their tour preparation.

It is important to note how heavily the NZC High Performance programme relies on the skilled and dedicated staff at all six Major Associations to help identify and nurture the talent coming through. Alignment is key, and building these important partnerships continues to help provide a consistent approach and support for our athletes.

It's hard not to get excited about the BLACKCAPS outstanding summer at home, with series wins against the West Indies (Tests 2-0, T20s 2-0), Pakistan (Tests 2-0, T20s 2-1), Australia (T20s 3-2) and finally Bangladesh (T20s 3-0, ODIs 3-0).

This set the team up for New Zealand's first Test series win against England on their home turf since 1999. But to brandish the Mace as the first inaugural winners of the ICC World Test Championship after an eight-wicket win against India on the sixth day at The Rose Bowl, can only be described as a truly historical moment for cricket for New Zealand.

At this time New Zealand is ranked by ICC as the No.1 team in Tests (reaching that for the first time in history this summer), No.1 in ODIs and No.3 in T20s. For a country the size of New Zealand, we should all be very proud of this accomplishment.

Adding to the success of the team are the number and quality of new players who debuted this year. Who can look past the incredible performances of newly capped players such as Devon Conway, who debuted in all three formats this summer finishing the season with a batting average of 65 in Tests, 75

in ODIs and 59 T20Is. His debut of 200 off 347 balls at Lord's against England will surely be a career highlight, and he was able to back that up with a series-winning 80 in the Test at Edgbaston and a 54 in the first innings against India in the ICC World Cup Test Championship. Not surprisingly, Devon Conway became the first New Zealander to be named as ICC Player of the Month for his incredible Test performances.

Results aside, it is important to note that the team's ability to inspire New Zealanders by their conduct off the field, is just as important as their results with the bat or ball. The values held and consistently displayed by all those within the BLACKCAPS and WHITE FERNS, continue to inspire young kiwis, as they watch their role models succeed on the world stage, both on and off the field.

Whilst the WHITE FERNS faced a challenging home summer, there were many highlights, such as Frankie Mackay's match winning double of 46 runs and 2-20 in the T20 against Australia at McLean Park and the back-to-back ODI half centuries by Brooke Halliday against England in February.

The exciting growth of the women's High Performance programme has been a true highlight this year, providing many talented young players opportunities to learn and grow in their game. Identifying this new talent and then bringing them in to centralised camps where they have been provided with opportunities to learn from current and past WHITE FERNS, has been a huge inspiration for these young athletes. Decentralised



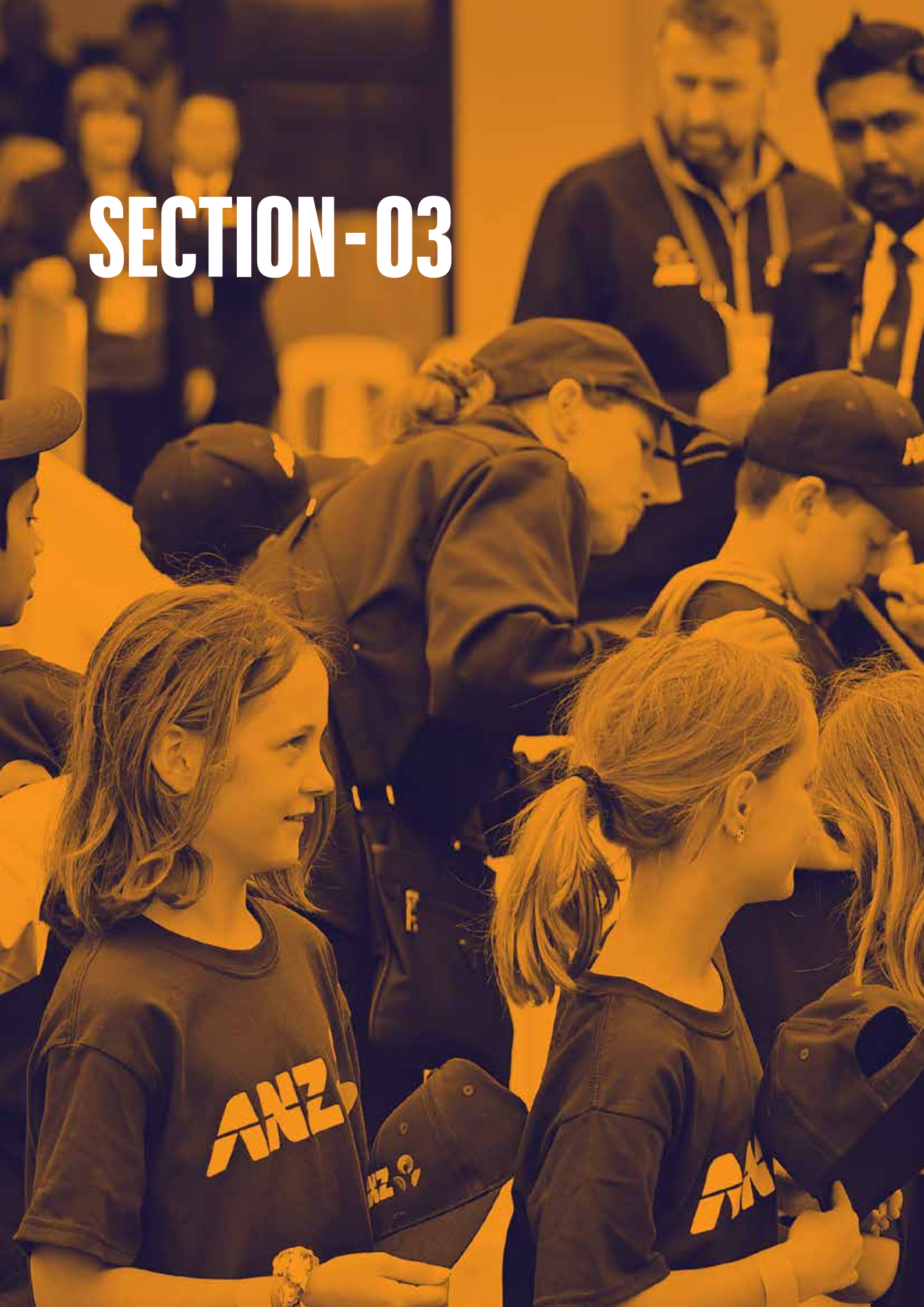


winter camps held across New Zealand also provided optimal training and learning opportunities for the amazing young cricket talent coming through.

Having the U19 women's squad playing three 40 over games at Burwood in Christchurch against a NZ Police XI, as well as the two NZ XI 50 over warm-up games in Queenstown against England,

provided great opportunities for these athletes to learn, as well as a safe environment for them to practice their skills out in the middle. The atmosphere of learning and trust that was created over these programmes, has reduced the pressure on these athletes allowing them to hone their skills, which in turn produced some assertive cricket which is an exciting prospect for the future of the women's game in New Zealand.

BRUCE RICHARD TAYLOR

WELLINGTON & CANTERBURY CRICKET ASSOCIATION
1943 - 2021

New Zealand Test cap No.108, Bruce Taylor, who died aged 77, remains the only player in the world to have scored a century and taken a five-wicket bag on Test debut.

Taylor achieved the remarkable feat in the second Test against India at Kolkata in 1965.

Having begun the second day unbeaten on 13, Taylor adopted a strategy of all-out attack, scoring a whirlwind 105 runs and alongside batting partner, Bert Sutcliffe, also racked up a record seventh-wicket stand of 163 in 158 minutes.

Taylor then celebrated with the new ball, taking five for 86 as India replied with 380, in what was eventually a drawn result. To demonstrate this was no flash in the pan - he followed that up with five for 26 in the

next Test as India were bowled out for 88.

He went on to play 30 Tests, capturing 111 wickets at 26.60 and scoring 898 runs at 20.41. On his last tour of England, in 1973, he played two ODIs.

Taylor played for Canterbury from 1964-65 to 1969-70, and for Wellington from 1970-71 to 1979-80.

His highest first-class score was 173 for Wellington against Otago in the summer of 1972-73.

Once his playing days had finished, Taylor filled selection roles for Otago, Wellington and New Zealand, and had a hand in selecting the New Zealand squad for the 1992 ICC World Cup.



JOHN RICHARD REID CNZM OBE

WELLINGTON & OTAGO CRICKET ASSOCIATION
1928 - 2020

John R Reid - a New Zealand cricketing great and the country's oldest surviving Test player, died in Auckland, aged 92.

Reid was regarded as one of the world's best all-rounders during his heyday in the fifties and early sixties and captained his country in 34 Tests including, most notably, New Zealand's first three victories.

Reid was a hard-hitting right-handed batsman and a brisk seam bowler who played 58 Tests, scoring 3428 runs at 33.28, while taking 85 wickets at 33.35. Of his six Test centuries, the highest was 142 against South Africa at Johannesburg, in the Boxing Day Test of 1961.

New Zealand Cricket chief executive David White hailed Reid as a colossus of New Zealand cricket in the post-war era, a player who led from the front in all three disciplines, and carried the hopes of his team, more or less, on his own broad shoulders.

"John R Reid was New Zealand cricket's Colin Meads," Mr White said. "He was, and will remain, a household name in this country, having helped pave the way for everything that has come in his wake."

In later life, Reid was president of NZCC, a New Zealand selector, manager, and an ICC match referee.

JOHN FULTON REID

John F Reid played a key role in the success of the 1980s New Zealand team, and was the man responsible for establishing both NZC's high performance centre at Lincoln, and its underlying grassroots development programme.

In the 19 Tests he played, Reid scored 1296 runs at an average of 46.28, including six centuries; his highest coming in the blazing heat of Colombo in 1984, when he scored 180 in 685 minutes against Sri Lanka.

Playing at a time when cricket in New Zealand was still amateur and when most home-based players had day jobs, Reid - a high school geography

teacher, opted against going on the 1985 tour of the West Indies, instead choosing to devote his energy to his pupils.

He later stepped away from teaching to become the first chief executive of Auckland Cricket before returning to it in a different form - turning his hand to coaching and high-performance development, and becoming a highly-respected mentor and administrator at NZC.

NZC chief executive David White said Reid had not only been a champion player but also one of the most influential administrative figures within the game - understanding the close

relationship between community and high-performance sport.

"Quite apart from anything else, John was the most lovely, engaging man who inspired all those around him, including generations of young men and women cricketers - he will be greatly missed," said White.

Iain Gallaway, who died aged 98, played three first-class games for Otago but will be forever remembered for his services to broadcasting, and cricket commentary in particular, during a 40-year career behind the microphone.

A past president, and life member of New Zealand Cricket, Iain was a lawyer by profession, albeit a "reluctant" one, having initially had his heart set on becoming a journalist.

Iain was a pioneer of cricket and rugby radio commentary, taking over from Dunedin's "Whang" McKenzie in 1953, and developing into New Zealand's pre-eminent sports broadcaster over the ensuing four decades, his gravelly tones, knowledgeable analysis, and dry sense of humour making his voice a household favourite.

Iain eventually became known as "The Voice of Carisbrook" although arguably his favourite cricket ground was Molyneux Park in Alexandra, where Otago hosted many of its fixtures over the Christmas and New Year holiday period. His signature line, "Not a Cloud in the Sky" was the title of his autobiography, published in 1997.

As well as being the Patron of the Otago Cricket Association, he served in a variety of capacities within the OCA and the Dunedin Cricket Association and was awarded an MBE in 1978 and a QSO in 1986, each for services to cricket, rugby, and the community.

He was also a former chairman of the Broadcasting Standards Authority, and a former, and long-serving Chancellor of the Anglican Diocese of Dunedin.



ROSS DYKES

**AUCKLAND & OTAGO CRICKET ASSOCIATION
1945 - 2020**

A solid wicket-keeper batsman for Auckland, Ross Dykes played 31 first-class games between 1967 and 1977, effecting 81 dismissals and making 723 runs at an average of 20.

No sooner had his playing career ended than he began his long service as a selector, first a 12-year stint with Auckland, then a stretch on the New Zealand panel between 1990 and 2005 – broken only by a year off in 1993.

Dykes was convener of selectors between 1996 and 2000; his most notable decision coming in early 1997 when his panel oversaw the selection of an 18-year-old Daniel Vettori, New Zealand's youngest Test player.

In this period he was also the manager of several New Zealand teams, taking sides to Bangladesh, India, Pakistan, South Africa, England and Australia.

Dykes moved to Dunedin in 2005 to take over the role as the chief executive of the Otago Cricket Association.

He served that role successfully for a decade, the most significant development during his tenure being the establishment of the University of Otago Oval as New Zealand's seventh Test venue.

He also acted for several years as an NZC match referee, overseeing first-class games, List A matches, and women's internationals.

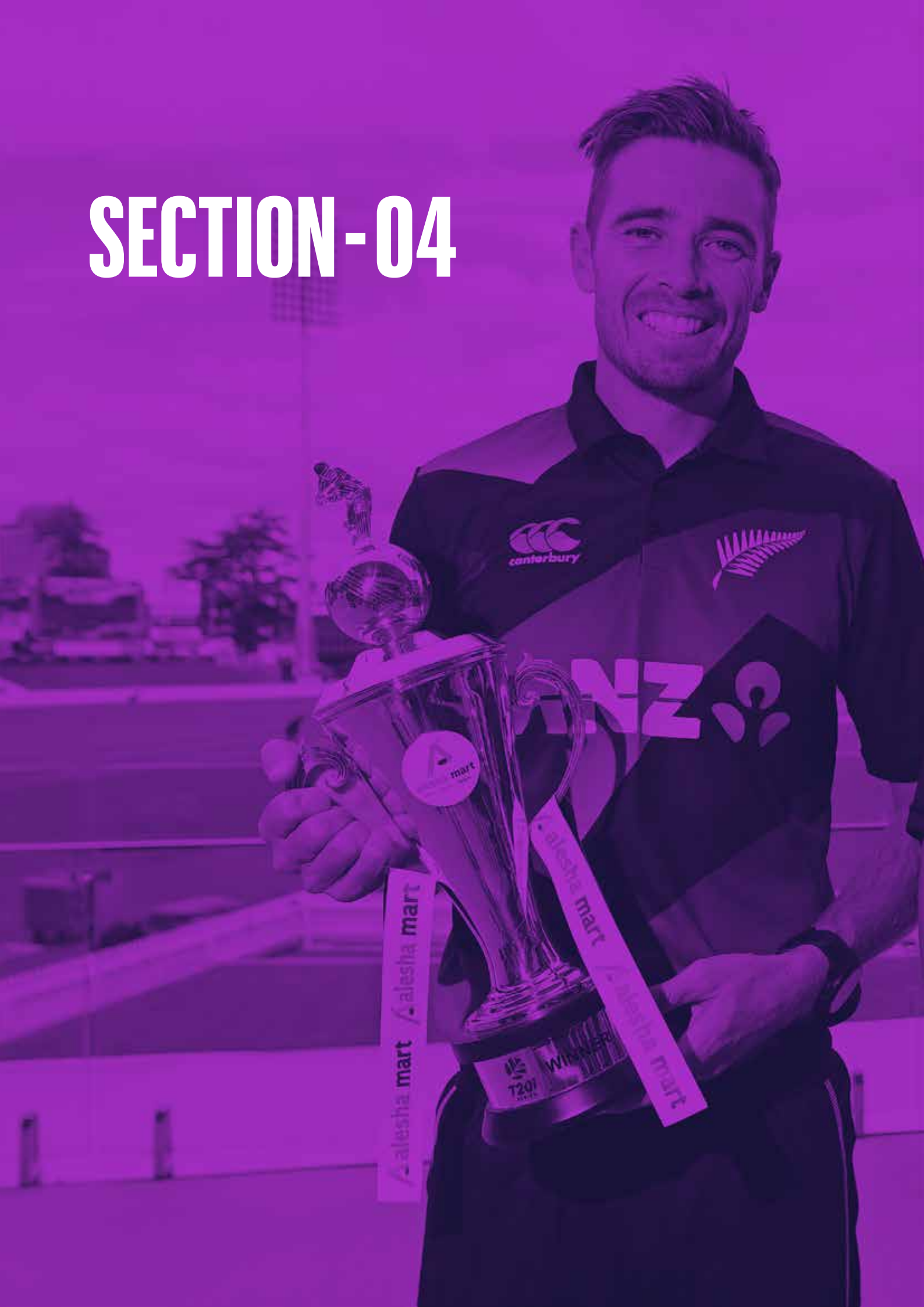

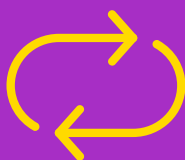

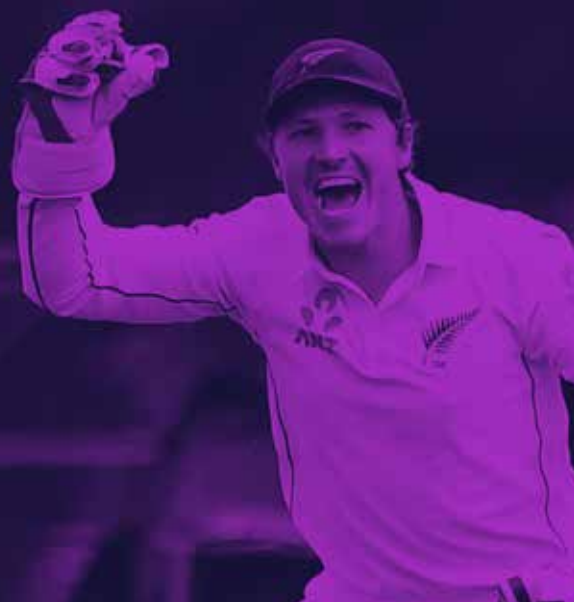

The 2020-21 season saw the curtain come down on the career of one of New Zealand's most widely respected cricketers, wicket-keeper BJ Watling.

The 35-year-old was a stalwart of the Test side since his debut in 2009 as an opening batsman, before establishing himself as a world-class keeper-batsman and claiming numerous records in his 75 Tests.

The Northern Districts gloveman retires holding the New Zealand Test dismissals record with 257 catches (excluding 10 as a fielder) and eight stumpings.

His bowler-keeper catching combinations with Tim Southee (75), Trent Boult (57) and Neil Wagner (55) occupy the top three spots on the New Zealand record list.

Watling's batting statistics are equally eye catching with eight Test centuries to his name and New Zealand records for the fourth and fifth highest partnerships: 362 with Brendon McCullum against India at the Basin Reserve in 2014, and 365* with current captain Kane Williamson against Sri Lanka at the same ground a year later.

He is just the ninth Test keeper to score a double hundred and was the first to do so against England, when his Player of the Match performance helped win a dramatic Test at Bay Oval in November 2019. He also featured in another New Zealand record-partnership in that match as he and Mitchell Santner put on 261 runs for the seventh wicket.

Watling was described by NZC chief executive David White as a courageous and determined

cricketer, White lauding his ability to rise to any occasion when the chips were down.

BLACKCAPS coach Gary Stead noted BJ's "team-first" approach and willingness to continually work on his game throughout his long career.

Slead said the outgoing wicket-keeper was the team's Mr Dependable and thanked him for his outstanding service to the BLACKCAPS culture.

Watling played his entire domestic career for Northern Districts featuring in 91 First Class matches, 62 T20 games and 90 List A fixtures for the Major Association.

SENSATIONAL SOUTHEE

Tim Southee became the third member of New Zealand's exclusive '300 Test wicket' club during the 2020-21 season, joining former team-mate Daniel Vettori and New Zealand great Sir Richard Hadlee.

Southee also sits in illustrious company worldwide, with only 34 players having achieved the 300 Test wicket milestone.

The Northern Districts paceman snared his 300th scalp at 'home' in the first Test against Pakistan at Bay Oval and has since gone on to take his career tally to 314* Test wickets.

DOMESTIC OVERVIEW

The 2020-21 domestic cricket season provided hard-fought competition across all three formats, with BLACKCAPS and WHITE FERNS representing their Major Associations and the best men's and women's domestic players on show throughout the season. Canterbury Cricket enjoyed a summer for the ages, creating New Zealand cricket history by becoming the first Major Association to win four titles from a possible five.

The marquee domestic competition, the Dream11 Super Smash was played over the Christmas holiday period with all fixtures run as double-header match days. It was a repeat of 2019-20, with the double-header final played at the Basin Reserve in front of a capacity crowd. The Canterbury Magicians prevailed in a thriller in the women's match, Lea Tahuu guided her side to victory despite an Amelia Kerr hat-trick and subsequently broke the Wellington Blaze's run of

three consecutive Dream11 Super Smash titles. In the men's final, Devon Conway led the Wellington Firebirds to back-to-back titles, defeating the Canterbury Kings by five wickets.

Canterbury continued their run of form in the Ford Trophy, the men's domestic one-day competition. The final, televised on Spark Sport and broadcast globally on NZC's YouTube channel saw top qualifiers Canterbury meet Northern Districts, with both teams featuring multiple BLACKCAPS. Henry Nicholls led the way for Canterbury, his 127* proving the difference between the two teams and handing Canterbury the title in the Ford Trophy's 50th season.

The Hallyburton Johnstone Shield, awarded to the champions of women's one-day cricket, consisted of ten round-robin matches for each team, played either side of the Dream11 Super Smash. The

Canterbury Magicians continued their stellar season, prevailing over the Auckland Hearts in the final, thanks to Frankie Mackay's 94* and Amy Satterthwaite's hand of four wickets and 73*. The Canterbury Magicians achieved the domestic double, and will go into 2021-22 as defending T20 and one-day champions.

The 2020-21 Plunket Shield started on Labour weekend with the first-half played before Christmas. After the white-ball season, the final four rounds took place from March 2021 into the first week of April. It was much of the same for Canterbury, dominating from start to finish and going unbeaten with five wins and three draws. This was largely thanks to performances with the ball as Will Williams, Fraser Sheat and Ed Nuttal all finished in the top 10 wicket taker charts and Canterbury ran away 40-point victors of the Plunket Shield.

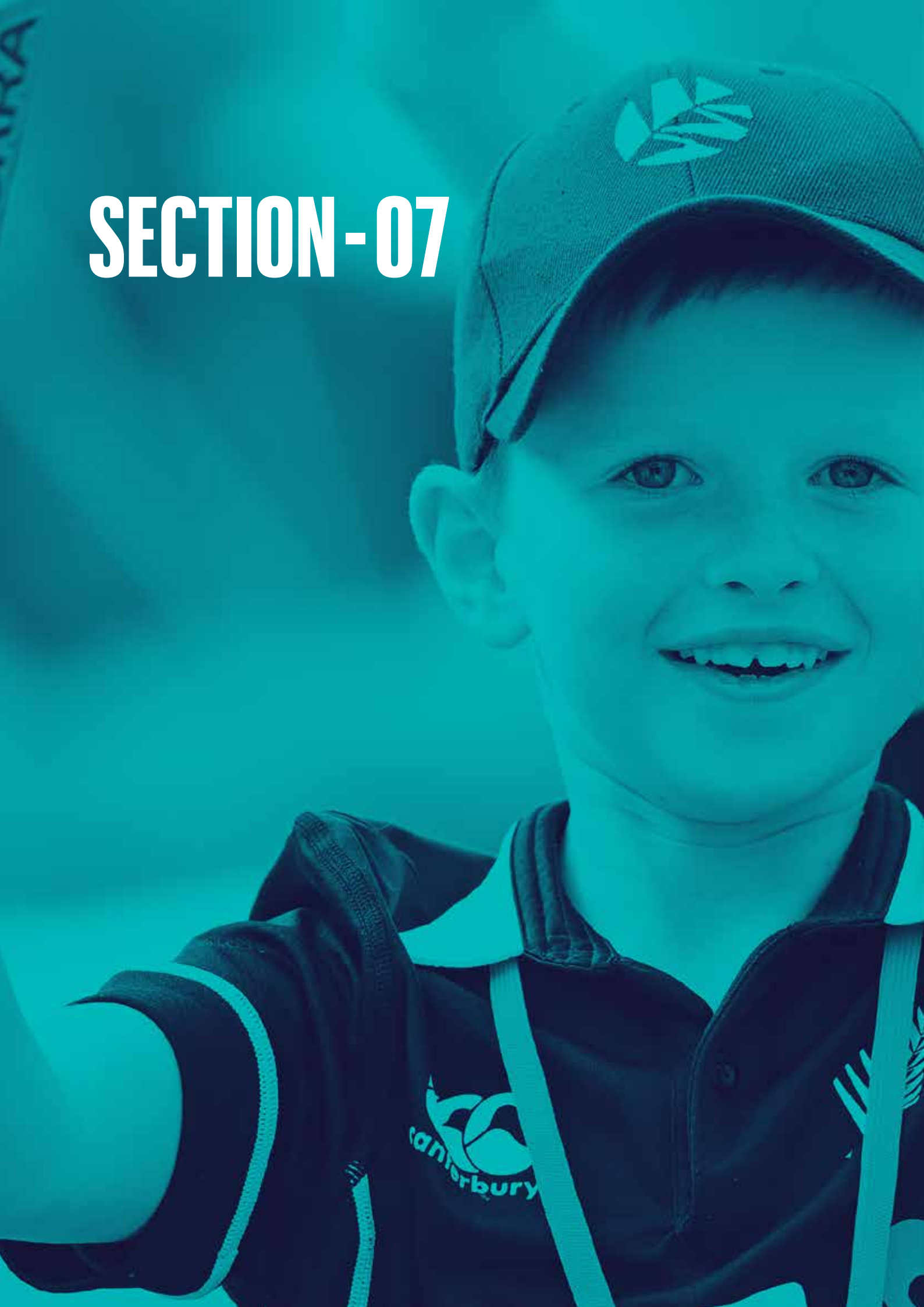

OUR FINANCIALS

"BEYOND 2022, THE OUTLOOK IS POSITIVE, WITH A STRONG PLATFORM FOR GROWTH BASED ON CURRENT BROADCAST AND COMMERCIAL PARTNERSHIPS, REVENUE GROWTH OPPORTUNITIES AND WITH ICC DISTRIBUTIONS EXPECTED TO GROW AS THE CYCLE TO 2023 IS COMPLETED."

The net surplus (before foreign exchange valuation adjustment) for the year ended 31 July 2021 was \$0.2m, against a budgeted loss of \$3.5m and a prior year surplus of \$1.5m.

The budget for the 2021 year was set in the context of a year of considerable uncertainty with the ongoing pandemic and revenue expected to be significantly down compared to previous forecasts and the prior year. However with the delivery of a full summer of cricket, NZC was able to deliver on commercial obligations for both domestic and international cricket. With lockdowns of various degrees and severity, managed isolation requirements, travel restrictions and some crowd limitations, it was a year of ongoing operational and financial challenges.

Revenue held up to prior year levels, buoyed by the continued support from NZC's broadcast and commercial partners, the level of ICC Member distributions and support from Government through Sport NZ funding.

ICC Member distributions held up to prior year levels despite there being no ICC World Cup or T20 event in the year. With a full schedule of world events within the eight year cycle (2016-2023), the total amount available to be distributed by the ICC across the period is expected to be similar to previous forecasts, although this continues to be heavily weighted towards the end of the cycle which culminates with the ICC Men's Cricket World Cup in India, in 2023.

Whilst the cost of delivering cricket during the pandemic has increased, this was partly offset by Government funding through Sport NZ to support the reset and rebuild of the sector. This supported a full schedule of domestic competitions to be completed, supporting our Major Associations and the wider cricket network.

A continued focus on operating costs was required across the year with a significant reduction in all discretionary and central NZC spend to offset the significant additional costs to deliver the 2020-21 season, including the cost

of managed isolation and the significant increase in inbound Tour squad sizes due to COVID isolation requirements. This also led to delivering two NZA home tours.

Player retainer payments have continued as planned in the financial year. The Master Agreement governing the professional men's game (2018 to 2022) is based on a proportion of revenue model, through which the players will receive a proportion of revenue generated from professional cricket. Player pool expense is recognised in the profit or loss when the relevant revenue from professional cricket has been recognised as defined in the Master Agreement.

NZC maintained existing funding levels to the cricket network throughout the year, a commitment that continues into the 2021-22 season including Major Association funding, national community cricket tournaments and domestic competitions. The investment in the Super Smash competition was also increased with a full schedule of double

headers for the men's and women's competitions and live streaming of all non-broadcast matches.

A full summer of cricket is scheduled to be delivered again in the 2022 financial year, along with a substantial number of outbound tours to meet FTP commitments and participation in ICC World events. The budgeted \$3.6m loss for 2022 acknowledges that the cost of delivering international cricket has significantly increased with the pandemic ongoing.

Beyond 2022, the outlook is positive, with a strong platform for growth based on current broadcast and commercial partnerships, revenue

growth opportunities and with ICC distributions expected to grow as the cycle to 2023 is completed. Whilst the impact of COVID-19 has been significant and is likely to continue to disrupt in the 2022 financial year, NZC has ended the 2021 financial year with sufficient reserves to meet its obligations, as and when they fall due and no adjustment is required to the carrying value of assets and liabilities at 31 July 2021.

While the NZC result shows an operating surplus of \$0.2m, the final result after adjusting for the valuation of our foreign currency hedging held at 31 July 2021, is a retained surplus of \$0.6m. The value of the foreign currency hedging at 31 July 2021 is an asset of \$2.6m (2020:

Asset \$2.2m). The foreign exchange contract valuation adjustment of \$0.4m is non-cash and an unrealised transaction, representing the notional value of exchange contracts for future years compared to the USD rate as at 31 July 2021.

As an Incorporated Society, NZC has no current obligation to prepare financial statements that comply with generally accepted accounting practice. NZC has continued to prepare its financial statements on a basis consistent with prior years, with no changes in accounting policy, and they are therefore special purpose financial statements.

NOTES TO THE SUMMARY FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2021

REPORTING ENTITY

New Zealand Cricket Incorporated (NZC) is domiciled in New Zealand and is a New Zealand incorporated society under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.

NZC is the governing body for the sport of cricket in New Zealand and is recognised as such by the International Cricket Council, of which NZC is a full member. NZC's principal activity is to promote and administer the sport of cricket in New Zealand.

BASIS OF PREPARATION

The summary financial statements are extracted from the special purpose financial statements of NZC for the year ended 31 July 2021 which were issued by the Board of NZC on 6 October 2021. The special purpose financial statements received an unqualified audit opinion dated 6 October 2021. The special purpose financial statements of NZC have been prepared in accordance with NZC's Accounting Policies and to comply with member reporting requirements. As an incorporated society, NZC has no current obligation to prepare general purpose financial statements that comply with Generally Accepted Accounting Practice in New Zealand.

NZC has reported an operating surplus of \$160k (2020: \$1,527k), with the final result after adjusting for the valuation of our foreign currency hedging held at 31 July 2021, a retained surplus of \$555k (2020: \$4,680k). The foreign exchange hedging valuation adjustment of \$395k (2020: \$3,153k) is non-cash and an unrealised transaction, representing the notional value of exchange contracts for future years compared to the USD rate as at 31 July 2021.

NZC, the Major Associations and the NZCPA are parties to the Master

Agreement governing the professional men's game from 1 August 2018 to 31 July 2022. The agreement is based on a proportion of revenue model, through which the players will receive a proportion of revenue generated from professional cricket. Player pool expense is recognised in the profit or loss when the relevant revenue from professional cricket has been recognised as defined in the Master Agreement. Player Pool expense recognised in the financial statements is \$14.80m (2020: \$14.12m) and player payments made during the year were \$13.94m (2020: \$14.12m), resulting in player payments owing (Variation Ledger Balance) of \$996k (2020: \$143k) (Note 12 and Note 20 of the full special purpose financial statements).

The Master Agreement governing the professional women's game was executed in August 2019. The women's player pool expense recognised in the financial statements is \$1.45m (2020: \$1.20m). Player pool expense is recognised in the surplus or loss in accordance with the defined rates and related schedule completed during the financial year.

The financial statements have been prepared using the going concern assumption on the basis that the level of ICC member distributions to 2023 (the end of the current rights cycle), will be as forecast by the ICC following the rescheduling of the ICC events, and given the revenue to be received from contracted broadcast and commercial partnerships over the next few years. NZC has sufficient reserves to meet its obligations, as and when they fall due.

The summary financial statements do not include all disclosures provided in the full financial statements and cannot provide as complete an understanding as the full special purpose financial statements which are available on request from NZC, PO Box 8353,

Symonds Street, Auckland, 1150. There have been no changes in accounting policies or restatements to amounts presented in prior years.

FUNCTIONAL AND PRESENTATION CURRENCY

The financial statements are presented in New Zealand Dollars, which is NZC's functional currency. All amounts have been rounded to the nearest thousand dollars, unless otherwise indicated.

BASIS OF MEASUREMENT

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, except for derivative financial instruments and the investment fund which have been measured at fair value.

RELATED PARTIES

Details relating to transactions with related parties are fully disclosed in Note 19 of the full special purpose financial statements. These predominantly relate to the Major and District Associations which are the members of NZC as provided for in the NZC Constitution. During the year NZC accounted for expenses of \$19,646k (2020: \$19,079k) to Major and District Associations. This included \$12,598k (2020: \$12,128k) in Major and District Association General and Other Grants, \$6,251k (2020: \$6,221k) for domestic player payments and \$797k (2020: \$730k) for service and hosting fees.

SUBSEQUENT EVENTS AFTER BALANCE DATE

There were no subsequent events which occurred after balance date requiring disclosure in the financial statements (2020: Nil).



Report of the independent auditor on the special purpose summary financial statements

The special purpose summary financial statements (the "summary financial statements") comprise:

Our opinion

The summary financial statements are derived from the audited special purpose financial statements ("financial statements") of New Zealand Cricket (Incorporated) (the "Entity") for the year ended 31 July 2021.
